DISCUSSION OF CALENDAR ITEMS

Calendar Item No. 3. Capital Electric Line Builders, Inc.-Award of Contract

The City Manager, Ms. Shelley Dickstein, said this item represents the last of the street light assessment replacement work. She said the participation goals were not achieved in this last phase.

Calendar Item No. 4. Jefferson Township-Other

The City Manager, Ms. Shelley Dickstein, said this item is a pay as you go recycling program that will be implemented in the City of Dayton in the future.

<u>Calendar Item No. 6. Emergency Ordinance No. 31846-20-Proposed Collective Bargaining Agreement with Dayton Public Schools and Calendar Item No. 7. Emergency Ordinance No. 31847-20-Fixing the Compensation of Unclassified Service</u>

The City Manager, Ms. Shelley Dickstein, said these ordinances are addressing compensation for the City of Dayton Mid-Management, Dayton Public School's AFSCME contracts for the next three years. She said the contract includes a zero percent wage increase, 40 hours of reduction of pay with five cost savings days, no change in healthcare, and two health insurance rate holidays where employees will not pay into health insurance.

Commissioner Mims thanked staff for the creative work during these challenging times.

CARES UPDATE

The City Manager, Ms. Shelley Dickstein, said Ms. Monica Jones, Assistant to the City Manager, Office of the City Manager, is the lead for the grants team that is task with spending \$17 million of the CARES Act in three months. She acknowledge other city staff that is helping to process all the paper work associated with this work. Ms. Dickstein invited Ms. Jones to present.

Ms. Jones said through Friday, October 9, 2020, the City is 45 percent encumbered and/or expensed. Regular contact with staff project managers and vendors indicates completion and invoicing is on track to meet deadlines.

Ms. Jones said there have been 230,000 mask distributed, 1,500 gallons of hand sanitizer purchased, 268 work from home stations ordered, 85 small business applications reviewed, 114 zoom meetings for CARES, 23,186 public safety hours worked, and 4,466 administrative hours for CARES.

Ms. Jones said the next five City Commission Meetings will include small business capital program grant agreements, learning pod professional services agreement with Boonshoft, a resolution for eligible personnel expenses, cultural assistance grant agreements, nonprofit assistance grant agreements and a few more technology, sanitization, and facility accommodations. She said all is needed to respond to or mitigate COVID-19.

SPECIAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT ORDINANCE No. 31848-20

Ms. Sandy Gudorf said this is the final step of the process for the Special Improvement District renewal. She said the Ohio Revised Code mandates that every five years the Special Improvement District be renewed. She thanked the City Commission for their support of the renewal. Ms. Gudorf said the renewal period is for tax season 2021 through 2025.

Commissioner Mims thanked Ms. Gudorf for her hard work on the long process of the Special Improvement District renewal.

Calendar Item 1. Sub-Item G1. Gordon Food Service, Inc.

Commissioner Fairchild asked for details for the expense of candy. Ms. Dickstein said this is part of the community program as an alternative to traditional door-to-door trick-or treating.

Ms. Parlette said as an alternative to Beggar's Night, the Recreation and Youth Services Department will offer a Drive-thru Fall Harvest Party on October 31, 2020, from 6:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. at Kettering Field. He said all participants must remain in their vehicles and children must be present to receive treats.

COMMENTS BY THE CITY MANAGER

The City of Dayton Family Justice Center

The City Manager, Ms. Shelley Dickstein, invited Major Brian Johns, Sergeant Roberta Bailey, Lt. Jason Hall, Domestic Violence and Intimate Partner Violence with the Dayton Police Department to provide an update on the Family Justice Center. They said several years ago they started talking about equity as it relates to customer service and improving the process.

Major Johns thanked the City of Dayton and other partners for the support of the new facility.

Sgt. Bailey said the City of Dayton Family Justice Center pilot project was implemented to better serve victims and survivors of Domestic and Intimate Partner Violence. She said current tasks for the building is establishing reliable parking for clients, in-house of partner support agencies, and increasing collaboration with criminal justice partners.

Sgt. Bailey said since reorganizing the Domestic Violence/Intimate Partner Violence Unit as a stand-alone unit and under one roof, they have experienced enhanced communication, cooperation and unity of message. She said successful outcomes of the unit is that a batterer was sentence to 40 months in jail.

Sgt. Bailey said Facilities Management painted and prepared a work area. Lockers have been installed for client use, video conferencing amenities are in the process of being procured, and the Drug Enforcement Agency has generously donated funds to enhance the center.

Sgt. Bailey said the Center will be opening to serve victims in-person on October 19, 2020. She said this will include the order-in of victims of felony crimes initially with misdemeanor cases to follow in the near future. She said they will be utilizing the City COVID protocols in order to protect staff and visitors and will continue to look for ways to improve the program to better serve the citizens of Dayton.

The City Commission thanked them for their work.
